



On December 28, 2023, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) announced a <u>Temporary public policy to facilitate temporary resident visas for certain extended family affected by the crisis in Gaza</u>.

In support of this temporary resident pathway, which took effect January 9, 2024, IRCC has amended the Settlement Program's Terms and Conditions to temporarily extend access of federally funded settlement services to eligible temporary residents. Changes to Settlement Program Terms and Conditions

The eligibility section of the Program's <u>Terms and Conditions</u> now includes the following clause:

"Individuals who are granted a temporary resident visa under the Temporary Public Policy to Facilitate Temporary Resident Visas for Certain Extended Family affected by the Crisis in Gaza; individuals holding a travel or other document issued by the Palestinian Authority, or their family members as defined in section 1(3) of the IRPR, who do not meet the eligibility requirements of the above-noted public policy and are issued a temporary resident visa based on exemptions from IRPA or the IRPR granted by a delegated officer on humanitarian and compassionate grounds between January 9 and December 31, 2024; individuals holding a travel or other document issued by the Palestinian Authority, or their family members as defined in section 1(3) of the IRPR, who do not meet the eligibility requirements of the abovenoted public policy and are issued a temporary resident permit by a designated officer where justified in the circumstances between January 9 and December 31, 2024; and temporary residents who were assisted in their departure from the Palestinian Territories by the Government of Canada between November 1, 2023 and December 31, 2024, are deemed eligible persons until March 31, 2027."

This temporary measure is effective immediately until March 31, 2027.

Demonstrating eligibility for Settlement Services in Canada

In order to receive settlement services, eligible temporary residents must show their status document (visitor record, open work permit, study permit or temporary resident permit) on which the notation "MOME2023" will be visible under the remarks section.

iCARE and Data Reporting

Client information can be entered into iCARE in the same manner as any other client receiving settlement services, that is, using the Unique Client Identifier (UCI).
